Nurse sharks are easily identified by the small mouth located forward of the eyes and just under the broad snout. The mouth is bracketed by two sensory barbels. Most nurse sharks range in color from light to dark brown, though rare albino nurse sharks also exist. Young nurse sharks have little black spots along their backs.

The nurse shark is light yellowish-brown to dark brown, and some have small dark spots. It has a flattened body and a broad, rounded head with two conspicuous barbels between the nostrils, which it uses to find food. A nurse shark’s mouth is filled with rows of small, serrated teeth for crushing hard-shelled prey.

An adult nurse shark is solid brown, with smooth skin, a broad head, elongated caudal fin, and rounded dorsal and pectoral fins. Juveniles are spotted, but they lose the pattern with age. There are numerous reports of nurse sharks occurring in unusual colors, including milky white and bright yellow.

Nurse sharks are one of the species of sharks that are able to remain perfectly still, and they spend most of the daylight hours resting in caves or under ledges, sometimes in groups of several individuals. During the twilight hours and at night, they become much more active and feed on fishes, rays, and invertebrates.

Full grown Nurse Sharks can weigh as much as 330 pounds and grow up to 14 feet in length. However, their location and their food sources can influence their size. They are a grayish brown color that allows them to blend in well to their surroundings. Their tail fins are very distinctive and account for about ¼ of their body.

Nurse Shark - Animal Facts and Information

The nurse shark is a nocturnal predator that feeds mainly on fish, stingrays, mollusks (octopi, squids and clams) and crustaceans. Algae and corals are occasionally found in their stomachs, as well. The nurse shark has a small mouth but its large pharynx allows it to suck in food items efficiently.

Nurse sharks have rounded, stubby heads with set-back eyes, and long caudal (tail) fins, which account for more than a quarter of their total length. They range from light yellowish tan to dark brown in color, and young nurse sharks have small black spots on their bodies.

The nurse shark is a large, sluggish, bottom-dwelling shark that is generally harmless unless provoked. It has very strong jaws, a stout body, and a wide head with obvious barbels (thin, fleshy, whisker-like organs on the lower jaw in front of the nostrils that sense touch and taste). The fourth and fifth gill slits are very close together.
